Beaver County Emergency Services currently beginning an update to the 2016 Beaver County Hazard Mitigation Plan which was adopted by the Beaver County Commissioners in October 2016. Most municipalities in Beaver County adopted the 2016 Beaver County Hazard Mitigation Plan as the municipal hazard mitigation plan. Each county and municipality is required under the Federal Disaster Mitigation Act of 2000 to have a current and adopted hazard mitigation plan. The hazard mitigation plan is used to support requests for public assistance and individual assistance after a federally declared disaster or to request pre-disaster mitigation grant funding. Without a FEMA approved plan, the municipality may be ineligible for assistance and funding.

Beaver County Emergency Services has secured a grant to complete the 2021 mitigation plan update. Beaver County has hired MCM Consulting Group, Inc. of State College, Pennsylvania and is currently developing a local planning team to assist with updating the mitigation plan. The plan update will be completed by Beaver County with involvement and input from numerous stakeholders. You have been identified as a key stakeholder. 





Beaver County Emergency Services currently beginning an update to the 2016 Beaver County Hazard Mitigation Plan which was adopted by the Beaver County Commissioners in October 2016. Most municipalities in Beaver County adopted the 2016 Beaver County Hazard Mitigation Plan as the municipal hazard mitigation plan. Each county and municipality is required under the Federal Disaster Mitigation Act of 2000 to have a current and adopted hazard mitigation plan. The hazard mitigation plan is used to support requests for public assistance and individual assistance after a federally declared disaster or to request pre-disaster mitigation grant funding. Without a FEMA approved plan, the municipality may be ineligible for assistance and funding.

Beaver County Emergency Services has secured a grant to complete the 2021 mitigation plan update. Beaver County has hired MCM Consulting Group, Inc. of State College, Pennsylvania and is currently developing a local planning team to assist with updating the mitigation plan.
